LENGTH OF TOUR

- Dependent upon;
 - Location
 - Dependents authorized/restricted



COMMAND SPONSORSHIP

- Required for Family Member Travel
- Takes time so plan ahead
- Steps
 - Obtain DA5888 (Family Member Deployment Screening Sheet) and DA7246 (Exceptional Family Member Screening Questionnaire)
 - Fill out 7246 and blocks 1~8 of 5888
 - Make appt. for EFMP Screening for Family Members at Hospital (take both forms to the appointment)
 - Dr. fills out Part B of 5888
 - Determines whether or not EFMP enrollment is warranted



SPONSORSHIP

- Mandatory to request a Sponsor (E1~06)
- You should fill out a sponsor request form DA5434 during reassignment interview
- Sponsors can be your main point of contact for information on the unit, housing, cost of living, areas of interest, etc...
- Youth Sponsorship Program & Spouse Sponsorship Program may be available at your new installation



TYPES OF ORDERS FOR Family MEMBERS

- Concurrent Travel
 - Pinpoint assignment
 - Housing will be provided within 30-60 days
 - Temporary Lodging Allowance (TLA)
 - Family members can travel with the Soldier or within 60 days of the reporting date
- Deferred Travel
 - Family members cannot travel with the Soldier
 - Family members will travel once housing is assigned
- Denied Travel
 - Did not receive "Command Sponsorship" (Family cannot travel to new duty station; can request a compassionate reassignment through your S-1)

Hearts Apart Program

• For FM who will be separated from their Soldier due to deployment or an unaccompanied tour.



SOFA STAMPS

- Required to stay in country for more than 90 days
- Can apply after receipt of Family Travel Message
- Passports (Travel office, Strom Thurmond Bldg., Room 100)
 - No Fee (prior to PCS)
 - Tourist
 - Joint custody of child under age 16, contact Legal office.



TRAVEL DOCUMENTS

- Entry visa (Can apply prior to departure from US) & Official Passports
- Visa (Permanent Resident) for non US Citizen dependents
- Command Sponsorship
- Orders



SHIPMENT OF BELONGINGS

Transportation Office, Room 102, 751~5137/5138)

- Hold Baggage
- House Hold Goods (HHG)
- Storage
- For your special duty assignment, this information varies. Contact Transportation for further information and specifics.



POV SHIPMENT

Transportation Office, Room 102, 751~5137/5138)

- Timing of Shipment
- One POV shipped at Gov't expense
- Adhere to guidelines for shipping POV overseas (inspections, cleanliness, ...)
- All POVs shipped overseas from the US are entitled return shipment
- Transportation office will do the initial paperwork and give directions to port.
- Reimbursed for one-way travel to the port

PETS

- Pets travel at the owner's expense
- Must have a rabies shot within 1 year and health certificate within 10 days
- Can fly as cargo, under the seat or via a pet shipping company
- Quarantine periods vary by location
- Breed Restrictions
- Most installations offer veterinary services

Housing – Miscellaneous Information

- Government support furniture is limited
- A request for furniture support can be signed when signing for housing (check quarters for existing furniture)
- ACS Lending Closet

Miscellaneous Information

- Bulky furniture may be too large to fit into the quarters, especially if quarters have stairwells
- Waterbeds are not allowed
- European electrical current operates at 220 volts; USA 110 volts

SCHOOLS

(https://installations.militaryonesource.mil)

- Installations will typically have schools from pre-K through High School
- Distant learning opportunities are available for some stateside colleges. You can still qualify for financial aid overseas.
- Home Schooling is an option
- CYSS services are available with same basic services, including Day Care and Family Child Care
- Specific information on schools can be obtained through Relocation Counseling



FINANCIAL ENTITLEMENTS (possible)

- Basic Allowance for Housing (BAH)
- Basic Allowance for Subsistence (BAS)
- Cost of Living Allowance (COLA)
 - Based on the cost of everyday living and varies

- Valid current U.S. driver's license
- Check guidelines inspections for auto registration
- Streets are narrow
- Insurance rates may be higher

Arrival (Mode/Means of Transportation)

- Traveling with kids
 - Take along toys, blanket & extra clothes
 - Activity bag (games, crayons, books, batteries)
 - Take copies of orders & index card with SM info

Arrival Mode Entry Point Operations

• Flights are very long, about 9-20 hours including the stop-over and ground transportation (depending on starting point)

 Pack a bag with basic toiletries, a complete set of ACUs and a set of PTs

• **Hand carry essential paperwork--orders, leave requests, passports, ID, etc...**

In-Processing Procedures

- Upon arrival at airport, your sponsor, unit rep or military liaison will arrange transportation
- A bus may transport you and your Family
- Your sponsor or unit rep should meet you upon arrival at your installation with a welcome packet
- Depending on time of arrival, you will probably meet with the in-processing personnel the next business day to start inprocessing procedures

Post Arrival Financial Entitlements

- Overseas Housing Allowance (OHA)
 - OHA is paid only if you are living in economy housing
- Cost of Living Allowance (COLA)
 - Based on the cost of everyday living and varies
- Move-In Housing Allowance (MIHA)
 - Lump sum payment (if authorized)

Temporary Lodging

- On-post lodging in Japan is typically limited depending on time of year
- On post lodging in Germany is typically small
- Temporary Lodging Allowance (TLA) is authorized in 10 day increments for up to 60 days in lodging
- If staying off-post, out of pocket expenses can occur
- Important: Sponsor assist with this prior to arrival



Vehicle Registration

• All vehicles 3-4 years or older must go through "control technique" before they can be registered. Registration fees apply

• Married Soldiers may register 2 vehicles without an exception to policy



CULTURE ADAPTATION

- Moving to a different country and culture can affect you more than you realize.
 - Fascination stage; fascinated with the new surroundings
 - Distress Stage; frustrated with problems encountered such as the language barrier or traffic problems ("Oh My God, there's no Super Wal-mart")
 - Re-integration stage; you refuse to accept the difference you encounter; you're angry, frustrated and hostile to those around you
 - Autonomy stage; this is the first stage of acceptance; you start feeling like yourself again
 - Independence stage; finally, you will become acclimated and adjusted to the new culture. With acceptance, you will enjoy your stay.



CULTURE ADAPTATION (cont'd)

- Don't just stay on the installation. Get out in the community and get to know the people and culture
- Get children involved in cultural classes (cooking, etc.)
- Volunteer opportunities for FM
- Be sure to attend both in-processing briefings and newcomers orientations at your new location
- Some installation may require you to attend an Intercultural Relations Workshop
